# Dimensions 2006

Every spring, the Saskatchewan Craft Council invites all Saskatchewan craftspeople to submit up to two handmade items for Dimensions, the only annual, open, juried exhibition of Fine Craft in the province. This year 94 craftspeople submitted 160 entries for consideration, which is an increased participation of about 20% over the previous year.

Dimensions is a dynamic representation of high quality Fine Craft in Saskatchewan. The unique attributes of the jurors, together with the fact that the exhibition is open to all Saskatchewan residents, allows both new and experienced craftspeople the chance to be included. Dimensions 2006 is a remarkable show of 35 exceptional works by 30 talented craftspeople from a wide variety of craft media. The Awards Ceremony and Opening Reception at the MacKenzie Art Gallery in Regina is a gala celebration of Fine Craft and craftspeople. Dimensions 2006 tours to several venues

# **Dimensions** Jurors

The Saskatchewan Craft Council entrusts highly qualified jurors with extensive knowledge of the Fine Craft movement and different specializations to select the Dimensions exhibition each year. Jurors spend two full days selecting the show and choosing the award winners. They are instructed simply to choose the best among all eligible entries, and not to concern themselves with selecting a specific exhibition or taking a curatorial viewpoint. Dimensions jurors participate in a public critique in which they are encouraged to speak about the reasons for inclusion or exclusion of specific works in the exhibition and to answer questions from the many craftspeople that attend.

# Juror's Statement



The Dimensions exhibition, sponsored and organized by the Saskatchewan Craft Council, is a juried exhibition, open to all amateur and professional artisans. It offers a glimpse of the breadth of fine craft practice in this province and provides a unique combination of exposure, education and dialogue to both the makers and the community at large. The large number of entries and exhibition venues every year indicate its worth and relevance. This exhibition and the following critique sessions with the juror are a rare opportunity for many people to get feedback on their work. Dialogue and critical input are often found in educational institutions, but are not easily available to artists who work in isolation and may lack the resources or confidence to seek out advice.

This was my first experience as a juror for Dimensions. I took the time necessary to become familiar with each piece as a distinct entity, reading notes as available, and keeping an open mind, especially about work that did not initially attract me, until I had examined and experienced the work on its own merits. This allowed me to discover many quiet and unexpected things, as well as different facets of work that was familiar.

The aesthetic and technical quality of the work ranged from the adequate to the highly proficient. Most pieces exhibited the maker's intent to excel to and beyond the best of their ability and to present ideas or techniques outside their usual practice. The failings were caused, for the most part, by over-reaching technically, inappropriate or unsuitable materials, clumsy imagery or presentation, and poor judgement in aesthetic choices. No pieces exhibited all of the above, and the shortcomings were mostly the result of inexperience, or unresolved experimentation.

The work in this exhibition succeeded beyond the technical and aesthetically pleasing. It offers, in addition to those qualities, intellectual, sensory and/or emotional engagement. Several pieces bridge the traditional and contemporary boundaries in craft with elegance and wit. Some exhibit a breathtaking mastery of materials and technique, while others simply breathe a few lines of visual poetry.

I selected works that induced delight, and/or exhibited originality, relevance and integrity, and could best illustrate the many facets and possibilities of their medium.

# Premier's Prize Award for the Outstanding Entry



ELIZABETH M. CUMING Saskatoon, SK Historic Saskatchewan (detail) 2005 batik feature catton, catton

batik, feature cotton, cotton batting; reproducing pictures in fabric with thread painting, paper piecing, appliqué, machine quilting. 195 x 170 cm \$2.000.00

"This quilt, an original design, was created for the province's centenary. It was motivated by the artist's love of history and historical buildings. It represents Saskatchewan symbolically, geographically, and historically. The province's crest, animal, plant and bird appear at the top. Geographical features of the province are depicted throughout the quilt. Historical events depicted include the coming of the North West Mounted Police to Fort Walsh, a buffalo hunt, Major General Middleton's forces marching from Qu'Appelle, and the North West Mounted Police marching from Fort Carlton toward Batoche where the battle ensued with the Metis.

The buildings signify our historical past and include the North West Territories Assembly House at Battleford, the Legislature Building at Regina, Stanley Mission Church, Batoche Village and church, Marr House in Saskatoon, St. Nicolas Anglican Church at Qu'Appelle, the stone house at Saskatchewan Landing, Government House at Regina, the Motherwell homestead, my grandfather Henry Fehler's homestead at Wolseley, and a Doukhobour barn at Indian Head.

The quilting techniques include an adaptation of folk art style using collage technique. I took digital photos of the buildings, forts, horses and Mounties, etc. on site (for example at Batoche, Fort Battleford, and Pion-Era in Saskatoon), adapted them and reproduced them in cloth with thread painting and machine appliquéd them on to the pieced landscape with satin stitching. Some feature fabrics were used and some photo transfers. Finally the piece was machine quilted."

# Jane Turnbull Evans Award for Innovation in Craft Award for Excellence in Quilting

"Lives of Girls & Women is a story quilt. It 'reads' from left to right, top to bottom. The piece is dedicated to my mother Daisy and to my female ancestors who were Quaker ladies.

Inspiration comes from "everything," Douglas explains, "it is all grist for the mill." She attributes events in her life and her voracious reading as being major sources of ideas for her work. She cites one example of plans for a "nifty little quilt" prompted by participation in a group addressing "women and anger" issues. Other concerns that have been expressed in her work are feelings about the nuclear industry, the environment and poverty."

# **Corinne McKay Merit Award for SCC Members**



MEL BOLEN Humboldt, SK Spring Melt, 2004 stoneware clay, terra sigillatta slip, glaze; wheel thrown, altered, carved, salt vapour glazed 18 x 28 x 28 cm \$600.00

"Strange things happen more frequently in the winter, climaxing during the spring melt, the dreaded Ides of March. This piece expresses some of that angst, instinctively.

Precise wheel throwing then intentional distorting, and a random directional salt vapour glazing on a terra sigillata surfaced stoneware clay, completes the statement."

# SCC Member Merit Award

"I have been interested in the "altered" book as a possible form of expression, but have long felt that most work in this field would be done as an original book.

This work deconstructs an existing book and turns it into a completely different set of structures that still reflects the original content."

# Award for Excellence in Craft

"This is the latest work from a series built around my interest in vee-shapes and the use of a diagonal in composition. Since 1985 I have made many pieces using a vee in different ways, and I am still finding new uses for it.

This piece combines molded, hand built and thrown elements, made of earthenware clay, raku-fired and reduced after firing."

# Award for Excellence in Wood



JAMIE RUSSELL Vanscoy, SK Grebe Courtship Bowl, 2006 Manitoba maple burl power and hand carving 21 x 30 x 40 cm \$1,200.00

"One of my favourite things to do is to go fishing in June. Grebe antics are a big part of these trips.

The burl is a fantastic piece of wood that otherwise would have gone to the tree dump to be chipped for compost. In addition to its spectacular grain the wildly interlocking fibres give stability that I can't get from a normal section of tree this big."

# Award for Excellence in Textiles

"Golden Stream is the 80" textile landscape of a series called 'Places of Peace.' This is a group of unique landscapes of intimate, serene locations where the natural world surrounds and interacts with the viewer."

"A landscape starts with what I like best, which is being in special, intimate, natural sites with trees, maybe some water, and lots of growing forms amid dancing light and shadows. Onsite photos, sketches, and notes are followed at the studio by more sketches. Then essentially I build a painted, textured canvas—thread by thread."

# Award for Excellence in Metal



#### CAL GANSHORN Regina, SK Damascus Dagger, 2006

1080 and 15N20 steel, Corian handle with inlaid nickel/chromium twisted wires; forged Damascus steel. Brian Sedo worked on handle 9 x 37 x 3.5 cm \$800.00 NFS

"The initial billet of steel was constructed alternating 17 different layers of 1080, a high carbon steel, and 15N20, a steel containing 2% nickel. The billet is heated, forged and stretched, then cut into three pieces. This process is repeated one more time and you end up with 153 layers of steel to make the dagger blade. This blade was forged by the maker using a propane fired forge and a 45 ton hydraulic press. After grinding to shape, the blade is heat treated at 1500 degrees Fahrenheit to harden the steel. The final process is etching in a ferric chloride solution. This brings out the two different types of steel used to make the blade and reveals the pattern that was forged into the billet of steel. This particular piece was forged in a "ladder" pattern."

# Award for Excellence in Functional & Production Ware

"It is very rewarding to be able to make something useful and attractive from a bundle of natural materials, especially if you have collected those materials yourself. There is a rustic natural quality to willow baskets that most people find is instinctively warm and appealing."

# Award for Excellence in Clay



#### JODY GREENMAN-BARBER Buena Vista, SK Sketches of a Pot, 2005 stoneware clay, engobe; wheel thrown, exaggerated throw marks, cut off wheel & placed off centre & stretched 15.5-21 x 14-22 x 14-22 cm \$300.00 (set of six)

"These wheel-thrown pieces represent an exploration in movement and energy. I set out to make a series of pot forms and treat them like sketches; drawings of a pot in threedimensional space. I continually search for new techniques that respond to my feelings as I use the pottery wheel. I give definition to the work by exaggerating the markings from the wheel that is expressed in the pushing, pulling, and manipulation of the clay. For me, sitting down at the pottery wheel is like dancing. Rhythm, movement, and gestural qualities are what I strive for in my forms."

# Award for Excellence in Surface Design

"This piece is about how everyone can be so different yet as a group be one."

Michael Hosaluk is recognized as one of the world's most creative woodturners. In 2004, he was awarded the Saskatchewan Lieutenant Governor's Award for Innovation in the Arts and was the 2005 recipient of the Saidye Bronfman Award. Hosaluk is a member of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts and was active on the Steering and Advisory Committees of the Furniture Society. Since 1982, he has been the coordinator of the biennial International Wood Furniture/Turning Conference.

His work has been exhibited throughout Canada, the United States, England, Germany and Japan. Hosaluk is the author of *Scratching the Surface: Art and Content in Contemporary Wood.* He has lectured throughout Canada, the United States, Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain, France, Norway and Israel. © Canadian Museum of Civilization Corporation
